Notes

Today's evensong program focuses on music and texts that remind us of God's abiding and unconditional love for each and every one of us.

Abbie Betinis's 3-part motet **Blessed Be the Lord, My Rock** was written on September 12, 2001, as a tribute to the victims and survivors of the tragedies the day before. The moving text from Psalm 144 escalates to two 4-part chords, then continues softly in unison "rescue, me, deliver me."

Bobby McFerrin is known for his one-hit foray into pop music stardom and, perhaps to some, for his remarkable career as a classical singer, conductor, and educator. The full title of his composition sung today is **The Twenty-Third Psalm (Dedicated to My Mother)**, and in it you hear not only the comforting and famous message of the twenty-third psalm but also McFerrin's deep conviction that women and particularly mothers are central to the ongoing health of the world and to having some sense of peace on our journeys.

The hymn **Hope of the World** was written by Georgia Harkness and was selected from over five hundred others in a search for a hymn to be used at the Second Assembly of the World Council of Churches in Evanston, Illinois, in October 1954. The theme of the assembly was "Jesus Christ, Hope of the World." Harkness was an American Methodist theologian and philosopher, considered by many to be one of America's first prominent female theologians. She was involved in the movement to legalize the ordination of women in American Methodism.

Eric Milner-White's well-known text was simply and beautifully set by Minneapolis-based composer and Lutheran cantor Robert Buckley Farlee. **Called to Ventures** assures us of God's love despite our ways being difficult, unclear, or simply unknown to us at this moment.

John Borton, bass, was a section leader in the Saint Olaf Choir and now sings with the Lange Ensemble, a Lansing-based choral ensemble that makes its home at First Presbyterian Church. He is an accountant with CLEARresult and lives in Lansing.

Celia Bridges, soprano, began her musical life as a cellist and developed a passion for chamber music. After earning a degree in music, she had a career in the world of stringed instruments. Her second and current instrument is voice, and she continues her love affair with chamber music by singing in various capacities—including solos, duets, and chamber ensembles, as well as cantor for Compline and Evensong services—at Saint Andrew’s Ann Arbor and elsewhere.

Anne Cain-Nielsen, soprano, is a statistician with Michigan Medicine. She grew up near Minneapolis, Minnesota, where she sang with various choral groups from elementary school through college at the University of Minnesota. Since moving to Ann Arbor in 2011, she has been a member of the UMS Choral Union.

Benton DeGroot, baritone, received his bachelor of music from the University of Michigan in 2017 and is now studying with Stephen Lusmann in pursuit of a master of voice performance. He recently performed in the university’s productions of Bernstein’s *Candide* (Dr. Pangloss), Britten’s *A Midsummer Night’s Dream* (Peter Quince), and Handel’s *Dixit Dominus*.

Christy Loewen, alto, was honored to sing in the choir at Saint Olaf College, where she completed her undergraduate degree in psychology and music. Christy now works at Emerson School in Ann Arbor, and on weekends, she can usually be found outdoors, enjoying trails, playgrounds, and downtown Dexter.

Josh Messner, tenor, is founding director of the Elm Ensemble. He studied music and theology at Valparaiso University and Islamic Studies at Luther Seminary in Saint Paul. He works at the University of Michigan on the marketing and communications team of the School of Public Health.

Sally Messner, soprano, is founding musical director of the Elm Ensemble and director of music at First Presbyterian Church in South Lyon, Michigan. Sally holds a Bachelor of Music from Valparaiso University and a Master of Sacred Music from Luther Seminary in Saint Paul.

Paul Organ, tenor, is a second-year doctoral student in economics and business at the University of Michigan. He is originally from Chicago and previously lived and worked in Washington, DC. Paul is excited to be back in the midwest and to be back singing.

Kraig Salvesen, tenor, sang with the Harvard Glee Club and more recently has sung with church choirs in Chicago and southeast Michigan, including the choirs of Our Lady of Mount Carmel on the north side of Chicago and those of Saint Andrew's in Ann Arbor. The proud father of a one-year old, he is pleased to be singing with the Elm Ensemble for a second season.

Kate Tegtmeier, alto, has been involved in music-making from a young age. Kate's love of music led her to earn a BA in music and Christian studies from Crown College in central Minnesota. Kate has a liturgical publications, logistics, and administrative services business in the Columbus metro area, where she lives with her husband, dog, and two cats.

Jon Ten Brink, bass, has engaged in concerts across North America in opera, oratorio, concert, chamber, and recital settings. He specializes in music from the Baroque era and performing new music. In demand as a clinician, he has given masterclasses across the US and works with high school and college choirs. He currently teaches at Lansing Community College.

Kira Thurman, alto, has been singing in choirs since she was in elementary school. A classically-trained pianist, she has sung in a variety of choirs in New York, Ohio, Indiana, and Michigan. When she's not singing or playing the piano, she teaches German history at the University of Michigan.

Alice Van Wambeke, alto, earned a Master of Arts in Organ Performance from Eastern Michigan University and a degree in harpsichord performance from the University of Michigan. Alice has served as church organist and choir director at Saint James for sixteen years, taught music and musical theater in Ann Arbor public schools for over thirty years, and has sung in the UMS Choral Union for fourteen years.

Nicole Warner, mezzo-soprano, a Wisconsin native, has sung everything from Bach to Rossini and from Berlioz to a world premiere by Finnish composer Olli Kortekangas. She has performed as a soloist with the South Dakota Symphony Orchestra, Milwaukee's Bel Canto Chorus, and the Mesabi Symphony Orchestra in the heart of Minnesota's Iron Range. She spends her days teaching people all over the world how to speak German and sings with them in German too.

Brian White, tenor, has a passion for oratorio work.
